From the Interim Rector

BLISTERS

A few years ago, a woman for whom I was doing pre-wedding counseling told me about a camping trip she had taken with her fiancé and his sons. Camping was not her thing, but she was willing. During an arduous hike, she stopped to rest, took off her boots, and discovered her feet were covered with blisters. Her fiancé took the time to minister to her, rubbing her feet and covering her blisters with moleskin, so she could proceed in comfort. She said that in the midst of the stresses inherent in planning a wedding and merging two households, she often thought back to that day, to remind herself why she wanted to marry her fiancé. I loved this story, and being of a like mindset, she and I began to think of the broader metaphorical implications of this little icon of loving kindness.

People can rub us the wrong way. Life can rub us the wrong way. Sometimes we can escape from the irritation; sometimes we just have to keep on going. But the blisters are annoying. They make us cranky, they cause us to move slowly. The big blisters can even hurt our hearts. Sometimes we just want to sit down and cry while we wait for our heart to heal. Sometimes we want to lash out at whatever is causing the irritation. Sometimes we just limp along, suffering and complaining, making everyone around us miserable. But there is a remedy available to us. Those of us who are part of a faith community can always find someone who will sit down with us, put soothing moleskin over our spiritual blisters, and encourage us to go on—if we stop and admit we are suffering. Most people don't have spiritual X-ray vision to discern our hidden hurts. Yet even if we have no such community, even if no one comes forward to help us, God is always waiting to help us and heal us—and God knows our wounds without being told.

Life gets more complicated every day. People are stressed, and overworked, and beset by all sorts of challenges. Blister-causing situations pop up everywhere. We all have a choice in our response. New shoes do not cause blisters on purpose, and most of the time, neither does life. We can't control life; we can control our reaction to it. Take time to examine your heart. Are you rubbing blisters, or soothing them? Being patient with the blisters of life is hard at first. New shoes often cause blisters, but when they are broken in, they become old friends. As we continue to grow in the faith, we will learn to do what Paul advises the Ephesians to do: "Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice, and be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you." (Ephesians 4:31-32) As our faith becomes as familiar as our favorite pair of slippers, we will learn to go through life neither inflicting blisters nor suffering unnecessarily from them. We will have the moleskin of Christ's love at the ready, eager to bind up our own feet and the feet of others, to keep us all moving forward joyfully on the path of faith.



Unlike the Hotel California, where "you can check in anytime you like, but you can never leave", there is always and eternally a choice to be made in Lewis's universe. Heaven is always available to those who are willing to accept God's love and healing.

You have plenty of time to get the book, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest it. Meet the Southeastern **Synod's Bishop-Elect** The Rev. Kevin Strickland



The Rev. Kevin L. Strickland, Chicago, was elected June 2 to serve a six-year term as bishop of the Southeastern Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during the synod assembly, held May 30 – June 2 at the Chattanooga (Tenn.) Convention Center.

Strickland was elected on the fifth ballot, with 199 votes. The Rev. Tiffany Chaney, pastor of Gathered by Grace Lutheran Church in Montgomery, Ala., received 158.

The bishop-elect has served as assistant to the bishop and executive for worship with the ELCA churchwide organization in Chicago since 2014. He served as pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Nashville, Tenn., from 2011 to 2014, and St. Paul Lutheran Church in Maryville, Tenn., from 2008 to 2011.

Strickland received a Bachelor of Arts from Newberry (S.C.) College in 2004 and a Master of Divinity from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in 2008. Newberry is one of 27 ELCA Lutheran colleges and universities, and Theological Southern Seminary of Lenoir-Rhyne University, Hickory, N.C., is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

Strickland will be installed October 5 at St. Philip's Episcopal Cathedral in Atlanta. The Rev. H. Julian Gordy has served as bishop since 2007 and will retire August 31.






